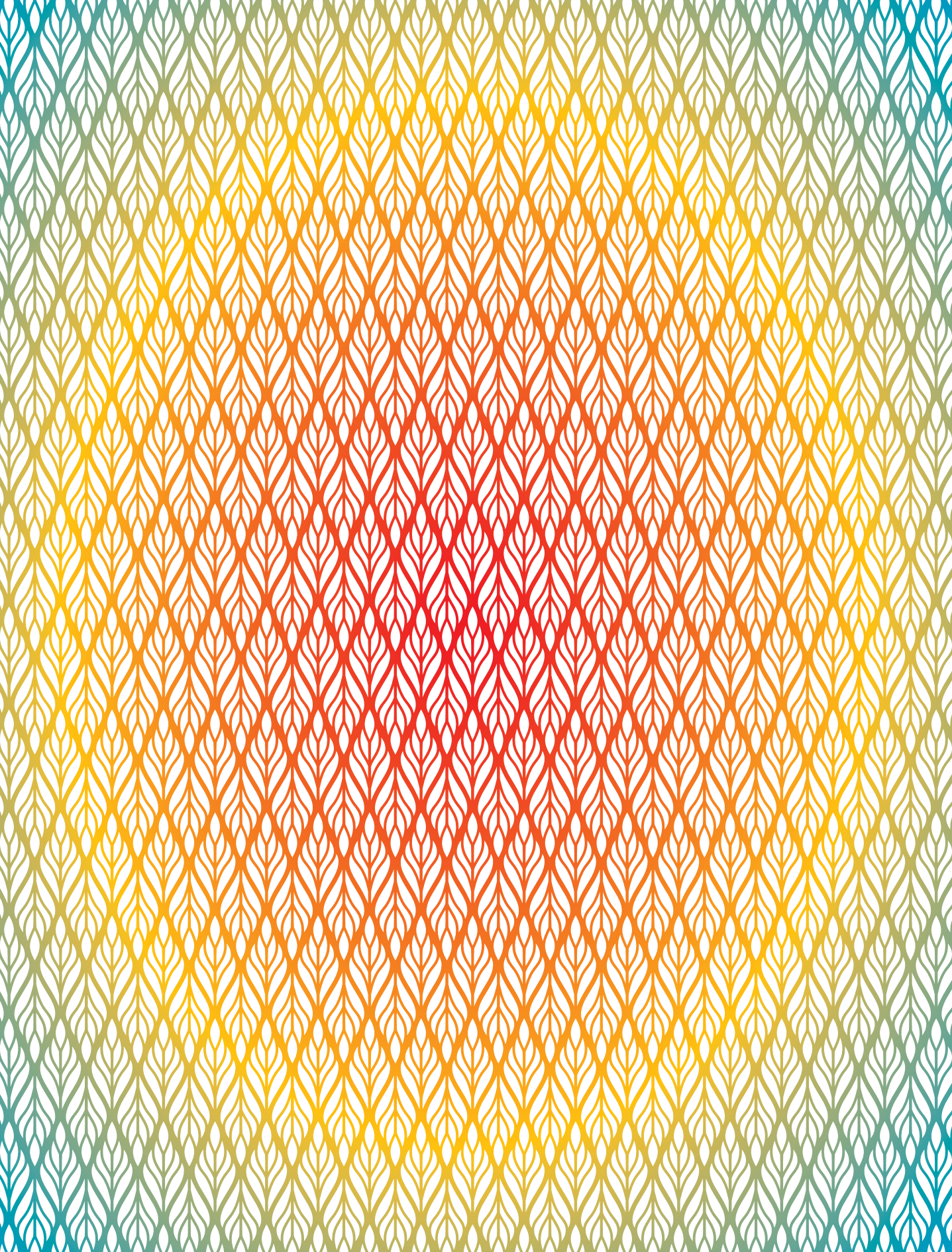

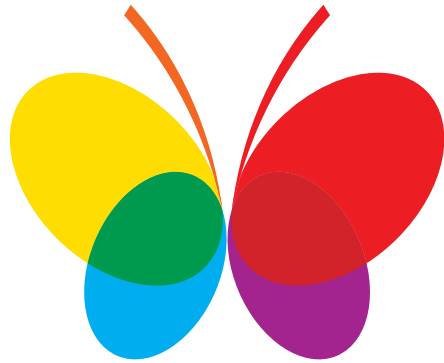

Congratulations to the beneficiaries of COLFUTURO 2018!

This year we chose 1,365 people out of a total of 2,840 candidates, which represents an increase of 6.6% compared to the number of professionals elected last year. Although this figure seems very high at first sight, the truth is: the resources available and allocated for this call had run out, but the vast majority of the people not selected had sufficient merits to have received our support. We send them positive thoughts and the hope that they manage to fulfill their academic projects in the near future.

This year is special, not only because COLFUTURO received the greatest number of candidates in its entire history, but also because it is the second year of the second stage of cooperation with the government through Colciencias. During the first stage, that began in 2007 and ended in 2016, we paid out a total of USD 229 million to 7,295 students: USD 120 million COLFUTURO and USD 109 million the Colombian government, through Colciencias. Perhaps the most positive aspect of this cooperation is that the entire sum of the money contributed by the government reached the students. In the second stage, also in cooperation with Colciencias and starting with the 2017 successful applicants, we want to reach the goal of 2,000 students supported per year in 2025.

Now I want to talk briefly about the results I find most interesting about this year's call for applications.

I'll start with the main destinations, which were again the United States, the United Kingdom and Germany, in that order. Australia and Italy surprise with their accelerated growth, since they were in the fourth and fifth positions, respectively, between 2017 and 2018.

The most in-demand programs are still Engineering, with 330 people, and Management and Business, with 171. As in recent years, Social Sciences and Law remain in third and fourth place of preference.

Also, it is worth noting that 684 of those selected are between 26 and 30 years old and 414 are between 19 and 25.

The total sum for the successful applicants in 2018 comes to USD 48.8 million, of which COLFUTURO will contribute USD 30.9 million and Colciencias will contribute the remaining USD 17.8 million. The former will be through a loan, and the latter through a scholarship.

The social diversity of the selected has increased: this year, 59% of the selected professionals come from families that belong to socioeconomic strata 1 to 4, i.e. 5% more than last year.

The contents of this Yearbook are presented in both printed and digital format, in Spanish and in English. We took great pains in preparing it to show the most important figures of COLFUTURO's efforts, intelligently, with dedication and transparency, which is without a doubt our core value.

I wish the 2018 beneficiaries the best results from your studies. We'll be waiting for you on your return, full of enthusiasm to transform lives for the benefit of Colombia!

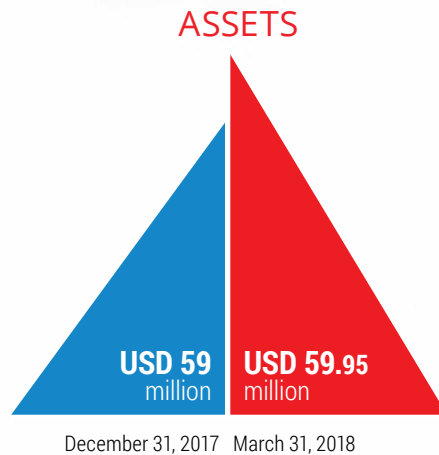

COLFUTURO history

The Foundation for the Future of Colombia (COLFUTURO) was founded in 1991 under the leadership of Ana Milena Muñoz de Gaviria. It is the product of a group of leading Colombians from the public and private sectors who were committed to developing Colombia by harnessing its human capital.

COLFUTURO has consolidated its position as the leading institution in Colombia for financing postgraduate studies abroad. Its model has been successfully replicated in Guatemala (Guatefuturo) and Honduras (Hondufuturo), thanks to the direct and extensive support from the Foundation. Since 2011, COLFUTURO has also worked with third parties, sharing with them its experience in financial management of external programs, as well as showing

them how to develop a full and robust technological platform. This enables them to handle processes such as calling for applicants, selection, program categorization, student administration and money transfers, as well as overseeing a portfolio of education support projects.

The Loan Scholarship Program has paid out USD 299 million. It has USD 17 million left to pay to reach a total of USD 316 million to support its beneficiaries.

It has USD 132 million ring-fenced for condonations.

Out of these, USD 13 million corresponds to COLFUTURO money and USD 119 million to Colciencias.

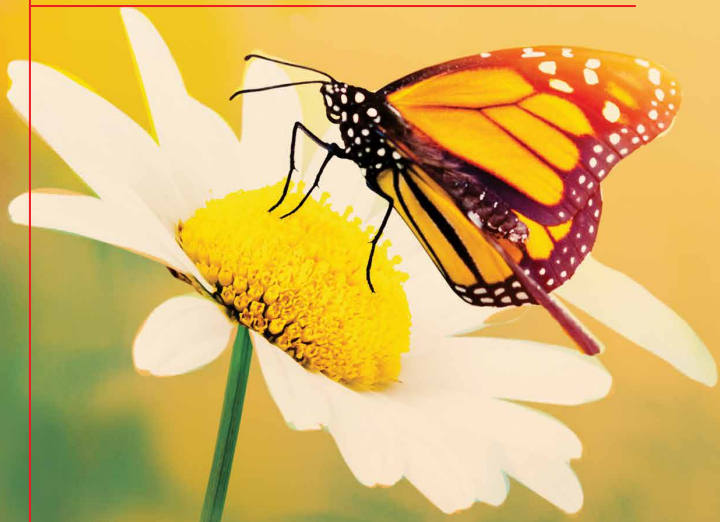

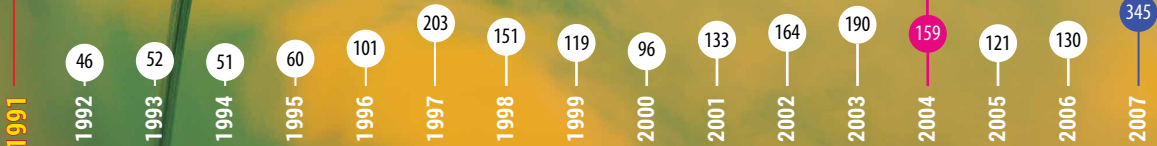

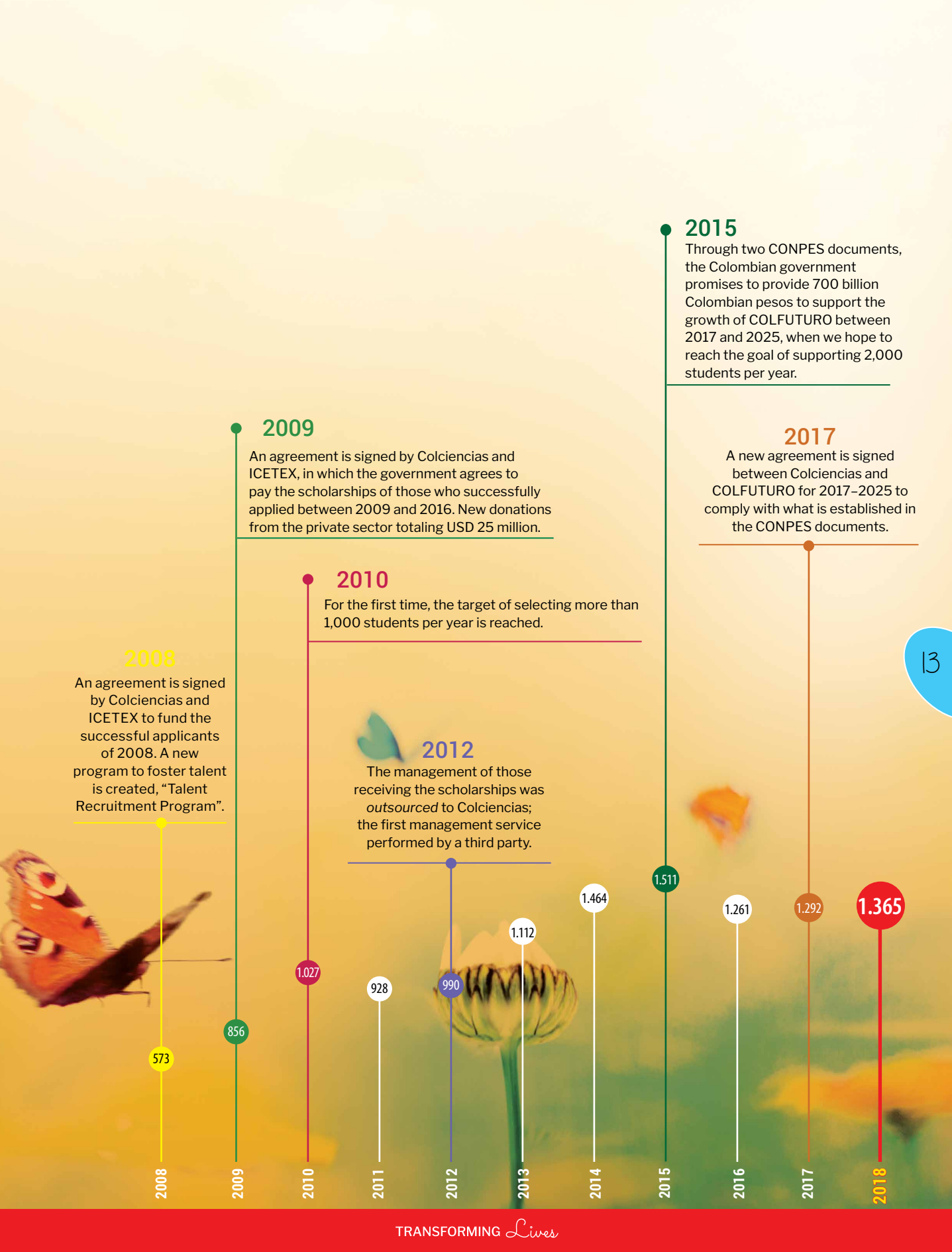

Scholarship Loan Program

This is COLFUTURO's main program. It was created so that the most talented Colombians could access postgraduate education at the world's best universities.

Thanks to the program, students can request a loan for up to USD 50,000 for two years to fund their postgraduate studies. Since 2017, the maximum amount that can be written off is up to 80% of the value of the scholarship loan.

Scholarship percentages depend on the decisions made by beneficiaries, thus:

Twenty percent of the capital for studies in Business or Law, and 40% for all doctorates and all other areas. In addition, 20% for those who work outside Bogota for three years and/or 20% for those who work in the public sector or academia for three years. These percentages for condonations are accumulative, whereby the scholarship component can reach up to 80%.

Within this program's scope, the only one of its kind in Colombia, a rigorous selection procedure has been developed. Their selection criterion is the academic excellence of the candidate and the program he/she is going to study.

To date, 27 students who have represented Colombia in the world's most prestigious universities have been selected.

The experience and seriousness with which COLFUTURO assumes the process of selection and management of the Loan Scholarship Program have consolidated this support model as a leading initiative in Colombia and Central America.

Support from the Colombian Government

In 2007, the first cooperation agreement between the Colombian Ministry of Education and the Colombian Institute of Educational Credit and Technical Studies Abroad (Icetex) and COLFUTURO was signed. A year later, this agreement was renewed through Colciencias, Icetex, and COLFUTURO.

By 2009, it was established that the Colombian government would assume, for at least nine years, the monies corresponding to condonations (scholarship) given to the professionals selected in the Loan Scholarship Program.

In 2017, Conpes 3862 of 2016 modified Conpes 3835 of 2015. It established the new condonation scheme for the Loan Scholarship Program, and committed COP 698 billion to support COLFUTURO's growth until 2025.

COLFUTURO has developed a rigorous selection process. Its selection criterion is the academic excellence of the candidate and the program he/she is going to study.

Candidates must complete the online application to participate in the selection process.

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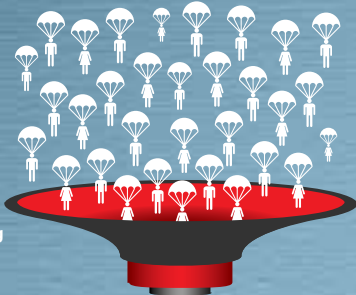
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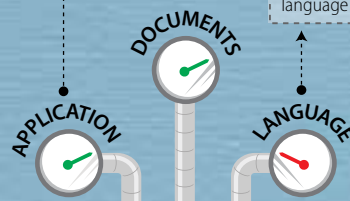

The online form must be totally completed.

The required documents must be uploaded within the established timeframes.

Proof of proficiency in a second language is a must. However, proving proficiency in more than two languages does not give a candidate any advantage over those who master only one language other than Spanish.



ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW



REQUIREMENTS

Candidates who do not meet the requirements or fall below the cut-off line in any given year may reapply the following year.

AREA COMMITTEES

Candidates are classified in one of the twelve fields of study. A committee made up of five experts for each of the specific field, and who hold a graduate degree from a foreign university, reviews the initial score COLFUTURO has given to the candidate profile and the graduate program. Once reviewed by the committee, the score is adjusted and the lists are reorganized for each of the fields of study.

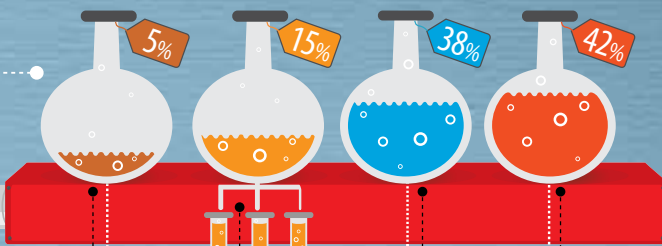

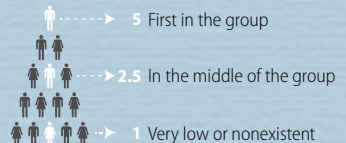
ASPECTS EVALUATED BY COLFUTURO
 Each item is assigned a percentage and is given a score from 1 to 5, where 5 is the top score. Once evaluated, the items are weighted, and added to obtain a final score.



The essay is graded by an independent evaluator hired by COLFUTURO.

The GPA determines the candidate's academic excellence in the undergraduate studies.

The candidate's position in the ranking of his/her graduating class is given a score from 1 to 5, and the score is compared with the undergraduate GPA. If the score of the ranking position is higher than the GPA, it is taken into account. But if it is lower or not available, the grade is proportionally distributed among the GPA, the selected graduate program and the essay.



The selected graduate program is a key element in the selection of COLFUTURO beneficiaries. Based on the search of information available in rankings, publications and webpages, among others, COLFUTURO identifies the international visibility of the graduate program and gives it a score from 1 to 5.

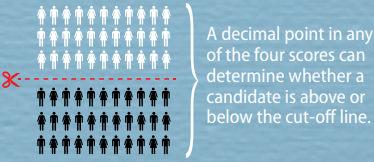
- 5 TOP - Among the best in their area

COLFUTURO beneficiaries selected are above the cut-off line.

The final list is handed to the **Board of Directors** at COLFUTURO, which undertakes a final review. Depending on the available budget, it may add or drop candidates in each area of study.

RE-ORGANIZED LIST

ACADEMIC COMMITTEE
 The members of this committee are part of the selection process since COLFUTURO was established. Their main function is to make sure that the lists provided by the Area Committees (after considering the selection criteria) are in line with the requirements and COLFUTURO's mission. They validate the cut-off lines proposed by the Area Committees.

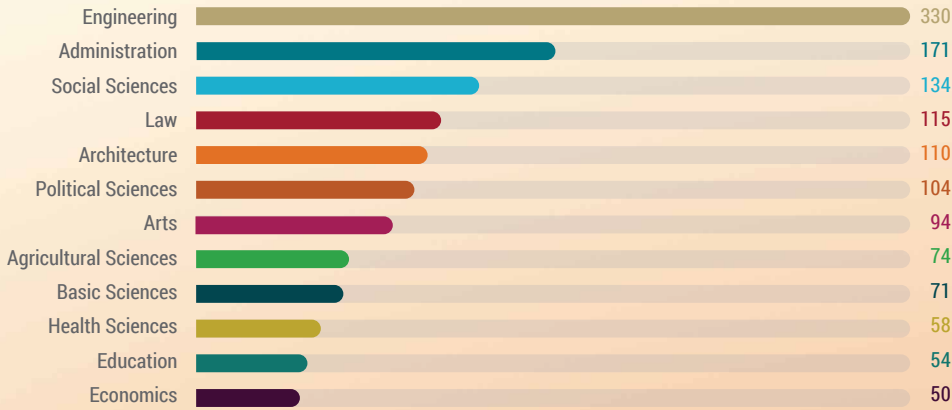

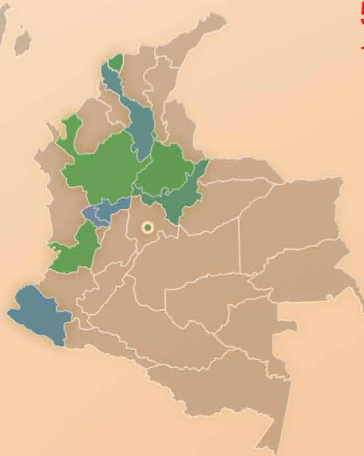

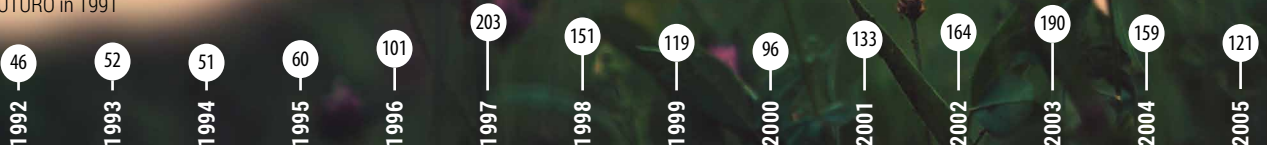
Top 10 Regions in Colombia



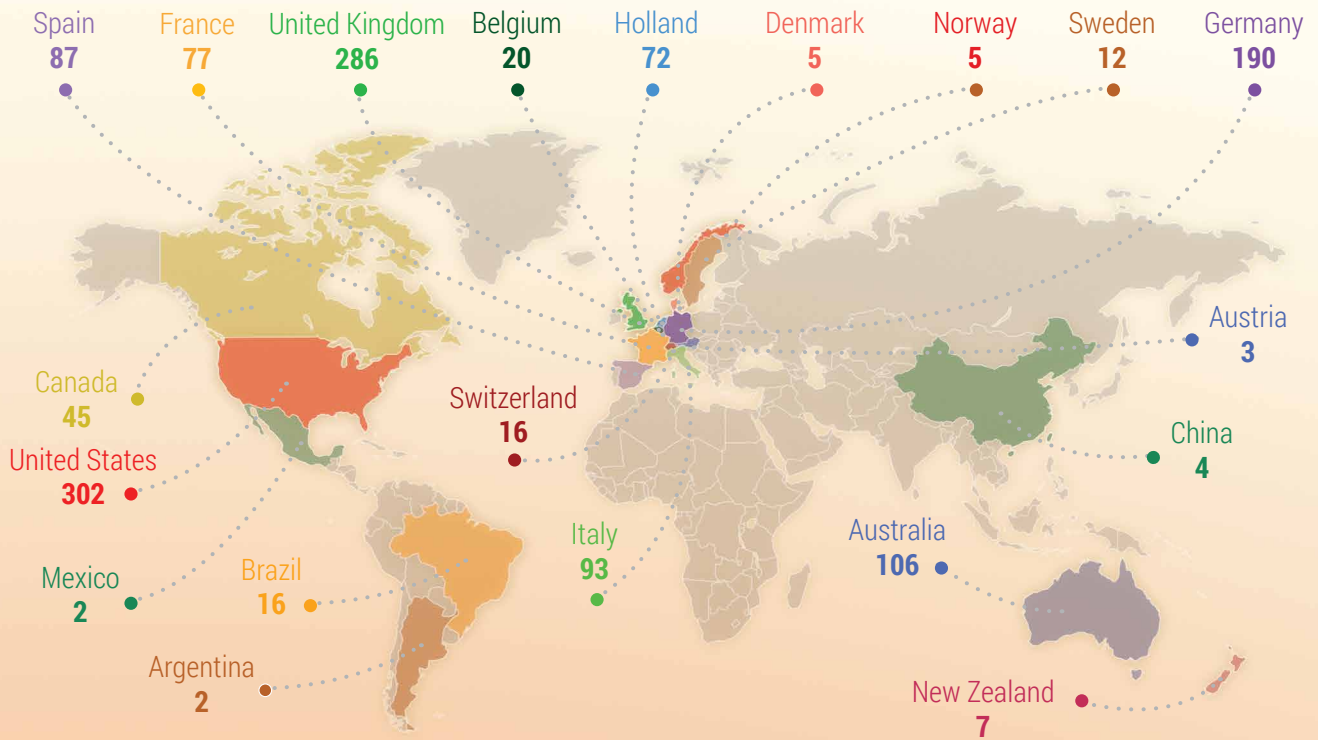

The number of beneficiaries has grown substantially since the creation of COLFUTURO in 1991

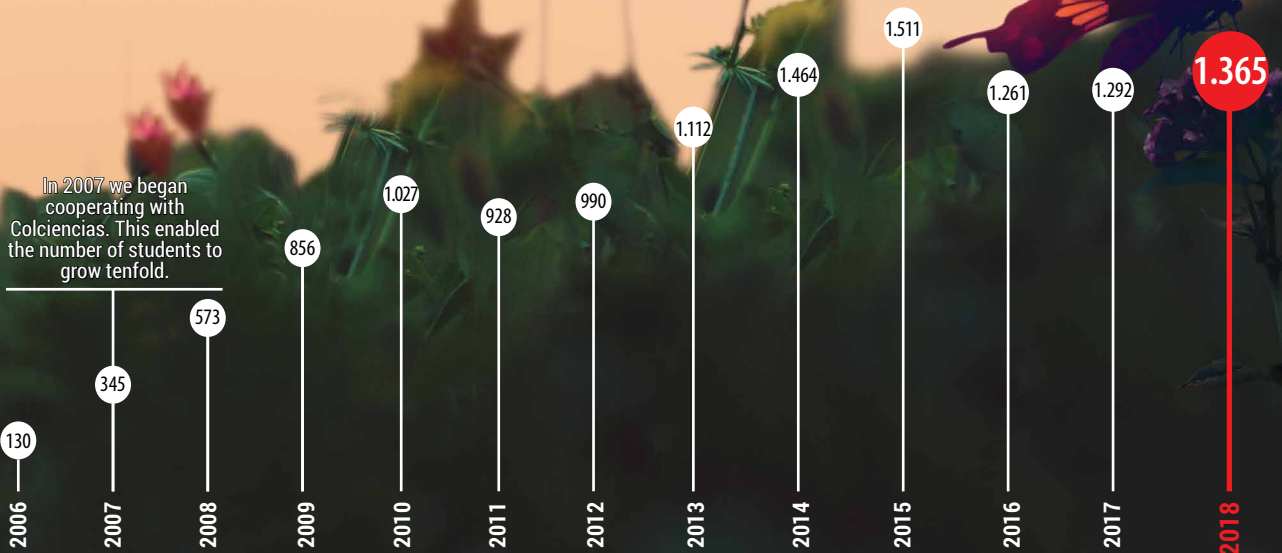


Top 20 destination countries

Talent Recruitment Program

This program was created with the purpose of encouraging greater participation from candidates with academic excellence; especially those from public universities, in COLFUTURO's calls for applications.

Three calls for applications are made per year to identify future members of the Talent Recruitment Program. The selection process is highly rigorous and centers on the academic excellence and leadership qualities of the candidate. It considers criteria such as the candidate's undergraduate ranking and weighted grade average, among other academic merits and recognition.

COLFUTURO's experience has shown that the main reasons whereby many of Colombia's brightest professionals do not decide to pursue a postgraduate degree are the lack of a second language, not knowing how to choose a university of academic excellence and the belief that it is impossible to finance the cost implied by living and studying outside Colombia.

The Talent Recruitment Program seeks to work directly on solving these problems with personalized advice via several tools: counseling, workshops, informative sessions, rating of postgraduate programs, reviewing of essays and application requirements. Applicants are provided with advice for up to three years.

Through the Talent Recruitment Program, COLFUTURO also intends to reinforce areas such as Engineering, Health Science, Basic Sciences, Economics, Social Science, Education, Arts, and Agricultural and Environmental Science.

The Talent Recruitment Program has been in place for nine years, and it currently has 1,120 members, who are in their last year of undergraduate studies or recently graduated professionals who have obtained an average that is 10% higher than their class. They belong to a research group certified by Colciencias, they have an Ecaes (Higher Education Quality Exam) that is 5% higher or have received a summa cum laude or an honors degree.

The Talent Recruitment Program provides counseling to participants during their process of searching, preparing for and admission to postgraduate studies at universities of academic excellence abroad.

Academic Counseling

This department of COLFUTURO is the gateway for the Colombian professionals who wish to pursue postgraduate studies abroad. Its main objectives are:

- Guide and advise those interested in studying a master's or PhD outside of Colombia so that they choose high-quality programs that fulfill their personal and professional expectations.
- Compile, throughout the year, serious and independent information that enables the analysis, evaluation, and classification of the universities and the postgraduate programs offered worldwide, to provide academic advice to those interested.
- Review and evaluate the Loan Scholarship Program candidates' Master's and PhD programs based on international rankings, accreditation and other postgraduate education publications.
- Negotiate and manage partnerships with universities and other institutions that offer our beneficiaries better opportunities to pursue their postgraduate studies.
- Participate in international education fairs, talks and events, to introduce COLFUTURO's work and promote postgraduate education abroad.
- Continually update the official website with diverse and useful material on postgraduate education abroad.

Languages

COLFUTURO's language program's principal aim is to promote the learning and improvement of a second language (English or French) for students and Colombian professionals.

The main benefits that the program offers are:

- Improvement of the language in universities from seven countries: Australia, Canada, United States, Malta, New Zealand, United Kingdom and France. The student decides the duration and destination of their program, within the 23 cooperation agreements signed by COLFUTURO.
- Partial scholarships (discount) are given on the value of the course, which range between 10 and 45%, depending on the university chosen by the student.
- Counseling is provided during the application process to the target university and the visa process is supported, depending on the country.

The selection process is especially centered on the motivation and thorough application of its candidates.

Throughout the year, full scholarships are awarded, to cover tuition, to students interested in the program as well as other outstanding members of the Talent Recruitment Program. These scholarships are offered by universities.

There are four calls for applications per year, in which more than 200 people interested in taking English or French courses abroad take part.

Networks, Employment and Entrepreneurship Program

The objective of this program is to support the beneficiaries in building a valuable network of contacts that allows them to carry out their work and entrepreneurship project.

To achieve this purpose, we work specifically on the following lines of action: work projection, networking spaces and strengthening of entrepreneurship.

Work projection

- Creation of strategic alliances with companies and government agencies from all sectors and according to needs, to expand employment opportunities.
- Development and implementation of tools and spaces that make it possible to observe and connect beneficiaries with companies and existing job offers.
- Creation of interactive opportunities to structure their career projects: resumes, interview, and job search.

Networking spaces

- Structuring and development of spaces, interaction and knowledge transfer, all aligned to the areas of COLFUTURO, the interests and needs of the beneficiaries and the relevant topics of the country.

Strengthening entrepreneurship

- Generating alliances with the entrepreneurial ecosystem, both national and international, to increase knowledge, projection, structuring and the approach to sources of financing for the beneficiaries' entrepreneurship projects.
- Strengthening of the COLFUTURO Network, which gives the best opportunities for beneficiaries, using strategies, alliances, technology initiatives, opportunities for learning, coordination, and interaction.

So that each dollar that COLFUTURO gives its beneficiaries will multiply itself, partnership agreements are signed with Colombian institutions, universities and international government representatives who award our students total or partial scholarships for enrolment, as well as other financial aid.

We have six national agreements and 88 with institutions in 16 countries, in all areas of knowledge.

National agreements

Proimágenes Colombia

The National Council of Arts and Culture in Cinematography (CNACC) has supported, since 2011, those who study postgraduate programs abroad associated with the audiovisual industry. The annual funds invested come from the Fund for Cinematographic Development (FDC, Spanish initials) and are managed by Proimágenes Colombia.

COLFUTURO beneficiaries who apply to a program dealing with the audiovisual industry may receive 45% of the scholarship outside the one awarded by the Foundation. The CNACC determines the beneficiaries according to the annual available funds.

As part of this agreement, audiovisual area professionals who meet the academic requirements may join the COLFUTURO Talent Recruitment Program. There, they are advised and guided throughout the selection process for a top-level postgraduate program with specific activities of interest in their area.

French Embassy

At present, COLFUTURO and the French Embassy have three lines of support:

- Support of talent recruitment programs.
- French Embassy - CEF.
- French Embassy Doctoral Education.

Support of talent recruitment programs

Those selected for the Talent Recruitment Program by the French Embassy have access to 400 hours of French lessons at the regional campuses of the Colombian-French Alliance, as preparation for postgraduate studies in France. Additionally, they receive a 25% discount on Campus France rates. Campus France is an organization that manages admittance to French educational centers, and it files the paperwork for a student visa.

French Embassy - CEF

The French Embassy, the Agency for Studies in France (CEF, the Spanish initials), and COLFUTURO signed an agreement that benefits Colombian professionals who study a master's degree or doctorates in France from 2018–2019.

The French Embassy and CEF, the organization in charge of promoting and facilitating the education of young Colombians at the best universities in France, will allocate EUR 120,000 annually for four years. These funds will be managed by COLFUTURO. It is estimated that 30 students selected in the Loan Scholarship Program (PCB) will each be supported with EUR 4,000. This amount will be credited to the student's debt with COLFUTURO once he/she returns to Colombia and fulfills the PCB regulations.

French Embassy Doctoral Studies

The French Embassy and COLFUTURO signed an agreement that benefits Colombian professionals who have enrolled in doctoral studies in France with the support of the Loan Scholarship Program, and who are in their first year of residency in France.

The French Embassy will allocate EUR 30,000 per year to this plan. COLFUTURO will manage these funds. It is calculated that 10 students selected for the Loan Scholarship who have studied their doctorate in France will be supported with EUR 3,000 each. This amount will be credited to the student's debt with COLFUTURO after he/she returns to Colombia and meets the Loan Scholarship regulations.

International agreements by country

Harvard University

With this agreement, COLFUTURO and Harvard University jointly support up to five PhD students, and up to 15 master's students per academic year.

COLFUTURO offers standard support to master's students, and Harvard supplements it, until the additional required cost is fulfilled. To do so, it uses money from the Colombia-Harvard Fund, and other funds.

COLFUTURO provides support to PhD students for up to two years, and a maximum of USD 50,000. Harvard, in turn, supplements COLFUTURO's support, and guarantees the funds from different sources to ensure that the total cost of the PhD, both for tuition and living expenses, is included in the scholarship.

GERMANY

DAAD

Thanks to this agreement, master's and PhD students who go to Germany receive a German course in Colombia lasting up to three months (only in the case of Human Science, Law, Economics, and related sciences), and another in Germany of up to six months before commencing their studies.

In addition, students have all the benefits of the DAAD scholarship holders in Germany. These include health insurance and another insurance policy against third party damages (which covers them and their dependents), as well as the cost of flights between Germany and Colombia.

DAAD supplements COLFUTURO's support distributed among several headings.

The Hertie School of Governance

Discount of 25% on the value of tuition for five COLFUTURO beneficiaries for a period of two years for Masters students and three years for doctorates.

AUSTRALIA

Australian National University

20% discount on the value of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

Macquarie University

Discount of 50% on tuition for two students admitted into the *Master by Coursework in Engineering and Technology, Social Sciences, Humanities, Human Sciences, and Natural Sciences* programs. The other beneficiaries of these programs will receive a 10% discount.

Monash University

15% discount on the cost of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into the university.

Queensland University of Technology

25% discount on tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries who meet the academic merit requirements established by the university.

Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT University)

Discount of 15% on tuition for eight *Masters by Coursework*, as well as 25% for 12 *Higher Degrees by Research*.

Swinburne University of Technology

50% discount on the cost of tuition for eight beneficiaries admitted into *Masters by Coursework*, *Masters by Research* or doctorates offered in the fields of *Science, Engineering, and Information & Communication Technologies* programs.

University of Adelaide

20% discount on annual tuition for beneficiaries admitted into *Masters by Research* and *Postgraduate Coursework* for up to two years of study. Those admitted into PhD programs may receive the benefit for up to four years.

University of Melbourne

Discount of 15% on the cost of tuition for beneficiaries admitted to graduate programs at the Melbourne School of Design (Faculty of Architecture, Building and Planning) and the Graduate School of Humanities and Social Sciences (Faculty of Arts). Beneficiaries accepted to other schools or faculties will receive a 10% discount.

University of Queensland

Discount of 25% on tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries in research master's degrees and doctorates.

University of Sydney

AUD 10,000 discount on the total value of tuition for 10 COLFUTURO beneficiaries in *Master by Coursework* programs, who begin their studies in the 2018 academic year (January–December).

University of Technology Sydney (UTS)

Scholarship of 100% for five students admitted to master's or doctoral programs: two for *Masters by Coursework* students and three for *Postgraduate Higher Research Degrees* students: *Masters by Research* and doctorates.

University of Western Australia

25% discount on the value of tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into master's and PhD programs.

Simon Fraser University - The Beedie School of Business

Four supported to the value of tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries: two at CAD 12,000 or 25%, and two at CAD 6,000.

University of Alberta

The beneficiaries admitted into the programs covered by the agreement will pay the value of tuition for Canadian students, as long as the beneficiary has requested more than USD 15,000 from COLFUTURO for living expenses.

Beneficiaries of COLFUTURO in doctoral programs of the university or of the institutions related to the agreement will pay the value of the tuition for Canadian students.

COSTA RICA

Centro Agronómico Tropical de Investigación y Enseñanza (Catie)

15% discount on the value of tuition for five COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into master's programs mentioned in the agreement.

DENMARK

Copenhagen Business School

20% discount on tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into the full-time MBA program.

SPAIN

Esade - Ramon Llull University

Esade will determine the percentage of financial aid for those COLFUTURO beneficiaries who meet the scholarship requirements established in the agreement. The discount will be a maximum of 20% of the course enrolment. It is possible that 100% of the budget mentioned in the agreement (EUR 60,000) is not awarded, either because the number of candidates is very low, or because not all of the candidates qualify to receive a scholarship from Esade after the Scholarship Committee evaluation.

IE Business School

Discount of 20% on the value of tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into master's and PhD programs established in the agreement.

Universidad de Navarra

Discount of 35% on the value of tuition for two students in the master's programs included in the agreement, and two scholarships with a 50% discount for students in PhD programs.

UNITED STATES

American University - School of International Service

Discount of 50% on the value of tuition for five COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

Carnegie Mellon University - Heinz College

75% discount on tuition for up to five students who are COLFUTURO beneficiaries. Aid will be offered for three semesters for the *Master of Information Science Management* (MISM) program, and for two academic years for the rest of the School masters programs.

Columbia University - School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA)

SIPA will establish an annual amount for partial scholarships for a limited number of students admitted into the *Master of Public Administration* (MPA). The aid for the second year is subject to SIPA's decision, and a GPA of at least 3.0 in the first year of study is required.

Cornell University - Johnson School of Management

USD 5,000 scholarship for a two-year period for at least two COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into master's programs.

Dartmouth - Thayer School of Engineering

Master of Engineering Management (MEM) students will receive a USD 6,400 discount for fall, winter, and spring. For the summer semester, the amount will be USD 960 for those in the Internship Program for the master's degree.

For master's and PhD students, the School will grant an estimated support of USD 23,000 for tuition, plus a monthly stipend of USD 2,110, which equals USD 25,320 per year. This aid will be for up to two years.

After this time, PhD students will receive full tuition estimated at USD 48,000 per year, and additional aid of USD 2,310 for living expenses. This support will be given according to academic performance and availability of funds.

Dartmouth - Tuck Business School

Discount of USD 20,000 per year for two students in the MBA program.

Duke University - Center for International Development

30% discount on the cost of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into master's and PhD programs.

Georgetown University Law Center

33% discount on the value of tuition for three COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into the LL.M. program.

Georgetown University - McCourt School of Public Policy

A maximum of five beneficiaries will receive a scholarship of at least USD 15,000. The School will evaluate the students selected by COLFUTURO to determine who grants this support, which can be renewed for the second year, depending on academic performance.

Harvard University

Via this agreement, up to five students per year in PhD programs benefit from full scholarships. Partial scholarships are awarded to up to 15 master's students admitted by Harvard University, and selected by COLFUTURO.

Hult offers two partial scholarships of 50%: one for the MBA program, and the other for master's programs. Additionally, it will grant six partial scholarships of 20% for the rest of the students admitted and selected by COLFUTURO into any master's program.

Scholarship donors will interview COLFUTURO beneficiaries in the *One Planet MBA* and *M.Sc Food Security and Sustainable Agriculture*, in order to select those who will receive support for their living expenses for up to two years, depending on the duration of the program. Likewise, if the value of the tuition exceeds the USD 25,000 financed by COLFUTURO, the scholarship will cover the balance. This support is available for persons starting their studies in the second semester of 2018.

University of Glasgow

20% discount on the cost of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

University of Leeds

50% discount on the value of tuition for one student in each of the following Master of Science programs: *Computing*, *Electronics and Electrical Engineering* and *Water Hygiene and Sanitation Engineering*. Similarly, the university will grant a 50% discount on the cost of tuition per year for a program that it identifies as a priority (this may change annually). Beneficiaries who do not receive the 50% may receive a 20% discount on the tuition fees.

University of Leicester

50% discount on the cost of tuition for two beneficiaries and 20% for those who do not receive this support.

University of Manchester - Manchester Business School

25% discount on the value of tuition for COLFUTURO beneficiaries admitted into the school (one-year support for one-year master's programs, and three years for M.Phil./PhD).

University of Newcastle Upon Tyne

10% discount on the cost of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

University of Nottingham

10% discount on the value of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

University of Reading

50% discount on the cost of tuition for two COLFUTURO beneficiaries.

University of Sheffield

20% discount on the value of tuition for all COLFUTURO beneficiaries. Two scholarships of £7,000 for two students admitted to the Faculties of Arts and Humanities, Sciences, Engineering, Medicine and Social Sciences.
